

Soleil's Maintenance & Repair Committee

ounded in 2020 by the HOA Board that handled the transition when PMC handed the ownership of Soleil over to the residents, the Maintenance and Repair Committee was developed to ensure our community is properly maintained and Soleil continues to be a great place to live.

Originally staffed with only five members—John Nettuno, Russ Cudmore, Jerry Boisvert, Wayne Dodd and Mike Levitan—the committee has grown to thirteen including Board Liaison John Nettuno and Committee Chair Ed Russo.

The committee's primary responsibility is to advise the Board on issues affecting common area repairs, maintenance and managing capital improvements throughout the community. They are also tasked with identifying and reporting security and safety issues for exterior common areas and the clubhouse facility. The committee regards the safety of the Soleil community as their top priority.

The scope of their job encompasses maintaining at least 38 areas within the community from the Guardhouse to the clubhouse, from fences throughout the community to 40-foot retaining walls, from sidewalks to resurfacing roads and so much more.

In 2024, they have completed 22 projects. Just three years ago, limited staff allowed the MRC to complete only three per year. Several MRC projects were covered in *Soleil Living* during the past year, but you may not have been aware that they were overseen by members of the MRC—projects such as rebuilding the bridges on Soleil's trails and resurfacing the outdoor pool.

The MRC saves residents money by serving as Soleil's project managers. Once a project is approved by the board, the committee develops a complete project plan including a detailed scope of work, project schedule and cost estimates. Each year, the MRC has been able to come in under those estimates due to detailed planning and project scopes, obtaining competitive bids and overseeing the implementation of every project.

Year-to-date, the MRC has played a part in managing maintenance projects throughout the community

with a cost of approximately \$230,000 and Capital Improvement projects costing \$92,000 for a total of \$322,000. In 2025, the project workload is expected to triple from 2024 levels. The MRC committee has already started planning several of next year's projects.

Quite a bit of planning and oversight goes into these projects. It's more than finding a contractor and then standing back and letting them take care of the job. The MRC provides daily project management oversight for every project, this allows the team to ensure each project is completed on schedule, within budget and per requirements.

Focus during the last few years has been on building the project management skills of the MRC team. This has allowed the MRC to effectively manage capital projects while supporting the ongoing maintenance needs of the community.

The team also continues to develop their knowledge of the community, infrastructure, utilities, fire systems, etc. The team had its first group class on the community's main services including the location and operation of each. Developing the team's knowledge of the infrastructure throughout the community allows the team to better manage daily maintenance and emergency issues.





"The LCMGA enjoys many competitive tournaments throughout the year," President Tom Snipes said. "All are designed to provide—first and foremost—a fun opportunity to enjoy the outdoors and the comradery of fellow golfers. A secondary benefit is that they provide a venue for members to test their skill level in the sport against that of other players."

LCMGA's premier event is the championship tournament. As the name implies, it's an opportunity for the members to put into practice the skills they have honed over the summer. Normally a two-day, 36-hole affair, this year's edition was limited to just one 18-hole round due to weather.

The Championship kicked off September 10 with 65 golfers evenly split among three flights. A testament to the exceptional play that day was the 53 birdies shared by 36 golfers. The players posting the best gross scores were Masters flight participant Jim Struck with 76, Champion flight Chris Garbow's 78 and Legends flight leader Paul Pointer with 85.

While all the flights are usually very competitive, this year's Masters version was especially so. When play concluded, there were four players tied with net scores of 71. Since day two was canceled, a scorecard playoff resulted in Doug Lockrem being declared Masters flight champion.

Golfers shooting closest-to-the-pin on the par three holes were Chris Garbow #2, Jim Struck #8, Frank Hansen #14 and Dwight Kees #17.
